# 👋 Hands-on Fun

#### New Friends, New Colors!

**Materials:** shallow trays (2 trays for each pair of students), tempera paint in primary colors, 1 large sheet of craft paper

★ Children can make new colors and new friends with this fun, colorful activity!



- ★ In advance, prepare shallow trays of tempera paint in primary colors: red, blue, and yellow.
- ★ Have children work in pairs. Give each pair a large sheet of craft paper. Then give each child in the pair a different color of paint. Invite both children to dip their hands in the paint and make handprints on the paper.
- ★ Next, have each child dip their hands in the same color paint again. Ask them to put their hands against their partner's and smush them around to make a new color. What color did they make? Now they can make handprints in the new color they made with their new friend! art/collaboration

## 👋 Hands-on Fun

#### Whose Shoes?

Materials: none

★ This easy game will help children learn their classmates' names!



★ Have children sit in a circle in the

> meeting area of the classroom. Each child will take off one shoe and put it in the middle of the circle. Then have children take turns choosing a shoe from the pile. (Remind them to not take their own shoe!)

- ★ Then each child will walk around the circle looking for the classmate who is wearing the matching shoe. Once found, the child will give the shoe to their classmate, shake hands, and introduce themselves, saying, "My name is \_\_\_\_\_, and I've found your shoe! What is your name?" The shoe's owner will say their name. The class will then say the name together in a friendly greeting.
- ★ For an added challenge, have each child share something they like as well.

# Which Apple Would You Munch for Lunch?

- Science Focus: apples
- Theme Vocabulary: munch, sink, float, rotten, core, stem, skin, seeds, flesh
- Skills We're Practicing: group discussion, critical thinking, vocabulary, visual discrimination

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## Literature Link

★ Ten Red Apples by Pat Hutchins combines delightful farm animals with important math knowledge. In the story, a farmer has a tree with 10 apples, but his hungry animals take the apples one at a time.



As you read this story, ask children to identify the animals they see. You can also ask them to predict how many apples are left and who they think will eat the last one!

### Hands-on Fun

#### Make Model Apples!

**Materials:** apple seeds, small paper plates, red tempera paint, paintbrushes, torn white paper or small coffee filters, sticks or brown pipe cleaners, glue sticks, leaves or green construction paper, scissors

- ★ Use leftover apple seeds to make scrumptious model apples!
- ★ In advance, set aside apple seeds to dry. If you're not using real leaves and sticks, precut leaf shapes from green construction paper, and cut brown pipe cleaners in half.
- ★ Give each child a paper plate, a paintbrush, and a small container of red paint. Guide children as they paint one side of their paper plate red to make the skin. Then have them make the flesh by putting torn white paper or a coffee filter in the middle of the plate.
- ★ Once the paint has dried, have children put seeds in the center of the apple. If they'd like, they can try to make a star, like they learned about in the issue!
- ★ Last, have each child glue a stem (a stick or pipe cleaner) and leaf (real or paper) to the top of their apple. Then ask about the apple. What are the different parts? finemotor skills/science knowledge

#### Hands-on Fun

## Hot Apple!

Materials: apple (toy or real), musicplaying device ★ Share apple facts with this fun,



hot-potato-style game!

- ★ Have children sit in a circle. Begin to play some music, making sure that you can randomly pause and restart the music.
- ★ Give a child the apple, and tell them to pass it to the person next to them and so on. Whoever is holding the apple when the music stops must say something about apples. It could be food made with apples (like applesauce or apple pie), where apples come from (a tree or a farm), or a description of the fruit (using descriptors like red or crunchy).
- ★ Continue the game until each student has had a chance to get "caught" with the apple. science knowledge/ cooperation
