



Teaching with: Ready to Shine (pp. 1-3)

Athletes from around the world prepare for the Paralympics.

Watch the video "Sports for All" as a class and discuss: What are some examples of adaptive sports? What do these sports have in common?

Differentiate for multilingual learners by calling attention to the idiom "the golden touch" in the article's introduction. Explain that this means the ability to be successful. The saying comes from an ancient Greek myth about King Midas. Everything Midas touched turned to gold.

Discuss as a class how the featured athletes work toward their goals. Then use the skill builder "Stick With It!" to guide students in setting and working toward their own personal goals this school year.

Are your students eager to explore more? Head to paralympic.org for a brief history of the Paralympics, descriptions and videos of the summer sports, and more. Have students take notes on what they learn.



Teaching with: Manatees on the Move (pp. 4-5)

Learn how a Florida zoo rescued three orphaned manatees.

Content Area: Life Science

NGSS: From Molecules to Organisms

Text Structure: Problem/Solution

Play the video "What You Need to Know About Manatees." Discuss: Based on the video, what are some dangers manatees face?

Support striving readers by calling attention to the pronunciation keys included for the manatees' names in the article. Point out that the syllable in all capital letters is the one readers should emphasize when saying the word, then model using the keys by reading the words aloud with correct emphasis.

Use the skill builder "Manatee Close-Up" to spotlight some physical adaptations that help manatees survive in their underwater homes. Have students work in pairs to answer the questions on the skill builder.

In the article, zookeeper Tara Lay says she felt both happy and sad when it was time to release the manatees. Discuss: Why did Lay have these mixed feelings? Can you think of times you have had similarly mixed feelings?



Teaching with: **Board Games or** Video Games? (p. 7) Explore both sides of the debate.



SET A GOAL



Paralympic athletes demonstrate resilience when they face challenges. What are some challenges you might encounter as you pursue your own goal? What steps can you take to overcome them?




